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## Improve Reading with Local Resources

**"Though he struggles some, I'm not sure my child really needs extra help developing reading skills. If there was an obvious problem of course I'd get him help, but is it worth the time and money otherwise? If so, I know what my school offers but what else is available in the community as a resource?"**

**When in doubt, find out.** Reading is not come automatic for many children. As you would with any part of development, when your child is not learning to listen, speak, move, or read as expected do not "wait and see" – get help to find out what exactly is happening. For example, letter reversals (reading or writing letters backwards even after repeated practice) should be outgrown by age seven. Research says we can effectively teach 95% of children to read at their grade level even with possible learning problems, attention weaknesses, dyslexia, language learning disabilities, etc. The key is to get the right help before they fall too far behind. For many children, that means using powerful non-traditional teaching methods. So, to answer your first question, start with getting a good evaluation that includes specific and practical next-step recommendations.
